Phragmites Removal Program: Landowner Interest Form

Phragmites is a perennial wetland grass that is threatening unique and sensitive coastal ecosystems along the Lake Huron shoreline. Well established infestations create dense monocultures that reduce aesthetic appeal, recreational opportunities, wildlife habitat, and native plant species.
